Invitation to Become TWW's Next President

Please consider taking this exciting opportunity to shape the future of TWW as it continues to expand in new directions. Members who are new to TWW and/or to weaving are very welcome to take on the President position.

The job description for the President position is below. We are looking for someone to run each of our four general meetings and coordinate with other Board members and committee chairs. The job requires a minimum of about 5-8 hours per each quarterly meeting for planning and running each meeting. The President's role is paid a \$150 annual stipend.

This position can be shared by two members. If shared, it is preferable that one co-president be able to attend in-person quarterly meetings, but the other co-president could be a distance member. Sharing this job has worked very well for recent presidents. Board members can – and often do – serve for multiple one-year terms, as desired.

New Board members will start their one-year terms on January 1, 2022. The current Board members will support the new Board members during a turnover period by assisting with various tasks such as writing checklists and calendars, requesting volunteers to serve on support committees, and by being available for questions/advice as needed. The outgoing co-presidents (Cynthia & Mary) will mentor the new president(s) and continue to serve as voting members of the Board during 2022.

Job Description for TWW President

President: Currently Cynthia McAfee and Mary Sylvia

From the By-laws: "The President shall preside at all meetings of the organization, appoint all committee chairs with ratification of the Board, be an ex-officio member of all committees, and shall exercise a general supervision of the affairs of the organization."

Proposed Mission Statement:

Guide the organization's activities to be in line with our stated vision, encourage member participation in running the organization, and safeguard the organization's assets and reputation.

This involves:

- Taking lead responsibility for the organization and serving as contact with other organizations;
- Holding regular Board meetings;
- Planning the business portion of the quarterly member meetings and presiding at each quarterly meeting;
- Ensuring that other leaders and groups within TWW have the resources needed to complete their missions and that their work is proceeding on budget and on schedule. These include:

Other Board members; volunteer position holders (Membership and Roster Chair, Website Manager, Historian); other committees (exhibitions, CNCH conferences, workshops, special events, etc.)

• Mentoring a new President and continuing to serve as a voting member of the Board for one year upon completion of one's final term.

The President receives an annual stipend of \$150.

Snapshots from the Annual Show and Tell Meeting May 8, 2021

Thanks to everyone who turned out for our much-awaited Show and Tell presentation! What a fantastic showing of work from our members and an inspiration for all of us.

As much as we love showing and telling in person, Zooming was a great opportunity for TWW members to share their work, work in progress, and inspirations with our growing membership who live in many places outside the Bay Area.

For some presenters this was a perfect time to try new techniques (twining, soumak, lazy lines, metallic threads), work on smaller weavings, draw more, or look for inspiration in other places they might not have had time for before. The meeting also had its bittersweet moments. Comments from members watching the presentations revealed that some of us had difficulty overcoming the challenges of the past year to do much weaving, and many of the presenters revealed personal stories about how those difficulties informed their weaving. Coronavirus lockdowns, personal losses, effects of climate change, social protests, the charged political situation – all showed up in different ways in the tapestries that were presented. This Show and Tell session seems to have come at a perfect time as life is starting to "get back to normal," and many of us are working to resume our weaving practices or start new ones. Our presenters gave us inspiration and filled us with new ideas for future work.





Teaching and Technical Problem Solving: Weaving the Eye of the Koi

I was happy to be able to start teaching Saturday morning classes, very carefully, outside, last August, with a propane heater when the weather turned cooler. Being together and weaving has always been a treat, but even more so this past year, when nothing was taken for granted.

Helping Haley Kotnik successfully weave the eye of the koi brought up some interesting technical considerations around how to have the eye "read" in a small space, on just a few warps:

- There is the temptation to make a shape bigger; we often wish for more warp threads, but maintaining the correct scale is essential.
- Increasing the contrast can often help with a small shape.

The tapestry is woven at 10 warps per inch, and the eye needed to be woven on five warps. The weft is made up of four fine strands for most of the tapestry. Using just two strands—half the thickness—even with the same warp sett, produces a finer weave. The first and fifth warps, the eye's outside warps, are black. The white dot of the eye is one dot, or "pixel," with only two strands of wool. We also wanted to make the shape round, so the outside black lines had to be long enough before moving in. With a small space you also can easily experiment to see what is more convincing.
